8:30am | School Security and Safety Overview, Paul Timm, PSR, RETA Security, Inc
Paul Timm is a board certified Physical Security Professional (PSP) and a recognized expert in school security. Vice Chair of ASIS International's School Safety & Security Council, he is certified in Vulnerability Assessment Methodology (VAM) through Sandia National Laboratories and the ALPHA0 vulnerability assessment methodology. Paul will describe approaching school security collaboratively employing practical ways to improve access control. Designing better visitor management procedures is key to crime prevention. He will also leave us with means to access helpful security resources. We are fortunate to have Paul speak to us this year!

9:30am | Design Concepts for Safe Schools, Officer Pete Matejick, Bloomfield Township

Recent tragedies with domestic shootings and bombings have put school security in the forefront of public awareness. This presentation explores school design recommendations from CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) and the Homeland Security Primer while balancing the desire to maintain open, inviting facilities that encourage collaboration and community use.

10:45am | Building Lockdown, Kenn Andridge, Ingersoll Rand Security Technologies

An edgy, out front, real-life presentation for crisis management utilizing instant lock downs programs to create safe areas, access restrictions, situational awareness, quick appropriate local alerts and a call to action in the face of immediate threats in K-12 school facilities. Kenn will cover preventative and reactive hardware security technology solutions for threats clearly related to the Newtown school incident plus issues stemming from potential distraught students or parents, health quarantines, extreme weather events, natural disasters, fires, chemical toxins, bombs or explosions. 12pm | BCC Update, Irv Poke, AIA, Bureau of Construction Codes

Irvin will present an overview of BCC technology upgrades and the development of a new process for the electronic submittal of construction documents for plan review. He will describe the use of focus groups and the impact that had on the process development. Irvin will also preview proposed legislation to allow the electronic signing and sealing of documents. Questions regarding the planned timeline and specifics of the process will be answered. For design and construction professionals, this is a presentation you do not want to miss!

The Michigan State Police is partnering with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to provide Safety and Security guidance to school districts throughout the State of Michigan. This presentation will focus on school security measures that can be implemented quickly and at minimum cost to a school district.

Approval of school plans by the Bureau of Fire Services before construction starts is critical to the success of any new or renovated school facilities. Learn about the Bureau of Fire Services plan review process. Find out about recent changes at the Bureau of Fire Services. The presentation will emphasize fire safety code concerns as they relate to building security with such things as door locking and secure vestibules.

4:30pm | Enhancing Safety in Schools, John Castellana, FMA, NEFF, Eduardo Blanc, Associate AIA, TMP Architecture

How do today's schools strike a balance between a welcoming atmosphere and a safe and secure environment? John and Eduardo will discuss recent projects that show how architecture can help to achieve aesthetically pleasing security solutions. The two will also present various electronic media solutions such as door controls and cameras, and how these elements can be combined with architectural features.

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What Does AIA National Actually Do?

Not many of AIA National undertakings and activities are clearly communicated and filtered to the state and local levels, leaving component chapters to wonder what AIA National does with all the dues AIA National collects each year! In order to better communicate AIA National initiatives to our membership, we will feature a category from the 2012 Accomplishments publication AIA National released at AIA National Grassroots in March.

This week we are featuring the "**Expanding Our Base**" category, which has four main focus areas under the umbrella topic of "Members":

Diversity:

A major initiative in all quarters of the Institute in 2012, the AIA recommitted to the Gateway Accord to improve the representation and management of diversity in architecture education and practice and hosted the first Multicultural Summit in Dallas. Women in Architecture members continued to establish a stronger presence in the profession.

Emerging Professionals:

An AIA Code of Ethics amendment established greater accountability among firm principals to track the progress of interns on the path to licensure.

YAF 20 Summit:

Observed milestone anniversary by advancing six strategic priorities to guide emerging professionals: Career Advancement, Advancement of the Profession, Value of Design Starting Your Own Firm, Value of Licensure, and Economy Change.

Convention:

The AIA national convention in Washington, DC, held in May 2012, met goals for attendance with 18,428 attendees, a 37 percent increase from the previous year. There was a 33 percent increase in AIA member attendance and 588 new members attended for free.
